

Data Protection Act

By the time you read this, or shortly thereafter, it will be a requirement of anyone holding personal data on computer to be registered.

The scope of the act is quite deep but briefly, the way it will effect any Einstein Users is as follows.

Should you be keeping data on such things as members of a club, you would be required by law to register the fact. There are exemptions to this such as payroll, pensions, names and addresses only used for distribution purposes.

My advice is, if you store data on private individuals, contact your local Citizens Advice Bureau for further information.

Two utilities to follow soon after the launch of the Word Processor will be "SCREENMAIL" a complete mailing module and "SCREENBASE" a Database to enable information to be integrated with the Word Processor.

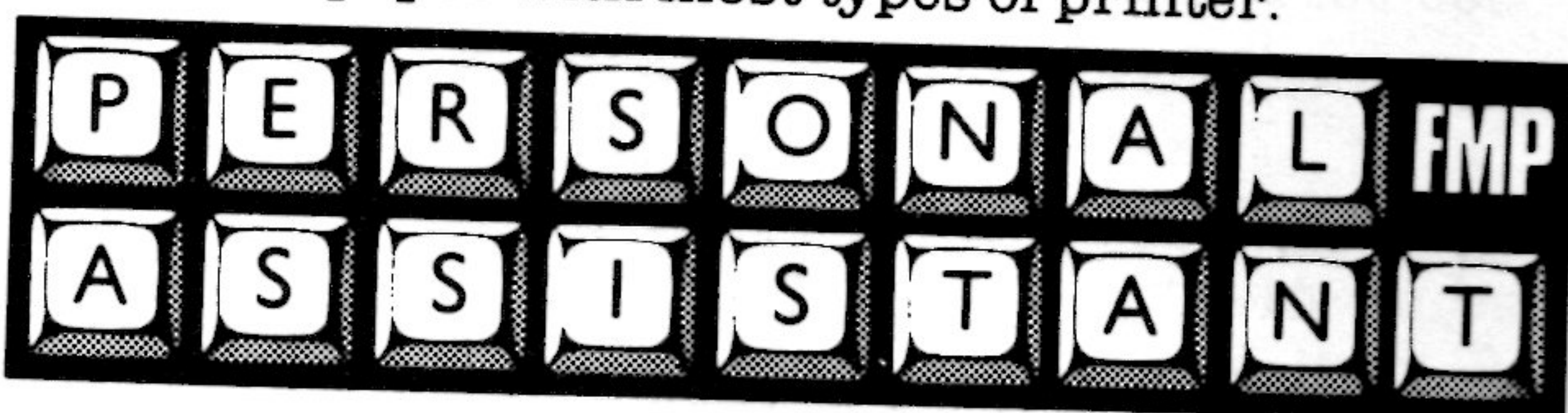

Many users of the Einstein computer have a need or would certainly like to experience, communications with other machines and remote data bases.

Shortly after the launch of the computer we at Northern Communications, took a long hard look at the bewildering array of modems and software to see what could be done for the Einstein.

We very quickly learned that the casual user, who knows nothing about modems and databases is very much, on his own! All too often it's a case of, Caveat Emptor (Buyer Beware)

Modems and software come in two categories, cheap and expensive, there is often little assistance available to get going and vital parts like connection leads etc are not supplied.

Being a Mail Ordering Organisation, dedicated solely to the Einstein we set out to put together a complete package, in partnership with a manufacturer, that would include everything necessary to get the system working, right from opening the box.

After consulting several suppliers of modems we finally chose Pace Electronics Ltd., not only because they were sympathetic to our plight but also they offered a top quality product at a reasonable price, with back-up support.

It has all of the features found in more expensive units, in a type approved, simple to use form.

Like the computer itself, their modem is capable of being upgraded, to keep pace with changing needs. They can offer sophisticated options, such as Direct Dial and Auto Answer which can be added when needed.

Not everyone wishes to take out an immediate subscription to Prestel or Telecom Gold but they do want to use their modems.

With this in mind we developed our own basic comms software, on 3" Disc, called somewhat aptly, "Pacer".

This allows users to get going quickly and is packaged with the

modem, plus interference wiring etc.

NB: Modem plugs in series with new style telephone jacking system, no extra BT socket required.

All this is now packaged, with the modem, at an all inclusive starter price, together with details of, "interesting" telephone numbers to ring. - It really can be fascinating !!!!!!!!!!!

A number of these special packages are already in the field and we are greatly encouraged by user feedback.

Certainly, the one-box, no more heartache approach has been very well received!

We believe that the future development of Einstein computing depends very much on its ability to communicate with other users and we feel sure that this specialist package shows the way, for both home and commercial users.

★★★ MORE A WAY OF LIFE ★★★

Agnes and Alistair Ward retired early
from the medical and academic worlds
and four years ago they started their
own business, Peach Computers Ltd
0475 673766. They specialise in writing
low cost business software for the
Tatung Einstein computer. Here they
describe their very attractive life style
and a few of the many friends they have
made.

We are really very lucky in living and
working in one of the most beautiful
parts of the United Kingdom. Our study
windows look out across some ten
miles of water to the snow capped
peaks of Arran. And recently we have
had blue skies as a perfect background
to the ocean swells rolling in from the
Atlantic. We have a wide range of birds
- some passing through from the Arctic
and others with us all year like the gan-
nets and eiderducks and the wild
swans. Not to mention the seal that pat-
rols our part of the coast living well on
rich diet of salmon and sea trout. An
ancient sea cliff lies behind us and
when stone age man lived here the
waves surged over what is now our
home and garden area. The cliff is a
sanctuary for wild animals and with
towering trees forming an attractive
woodland area which is full of snow
drops at present and just ready to burst
into the golden yellow of wild daffodils.
The wood folk include dear foxes owls
and a wild mob of small birds who are
good judges of when our fruit trees and
bushes are ready.

Our home is also our workplace and it
is difficult to imagine a better environ-
ment for writing computer software.
Nowadays as well as our standard
Peach Pack we are more and more
being asked to write customised busi-
ness programs for special applications.
We are anything but isolated and get
calls and letters from all over the world.
And there is really something very
attractive and nice in the contrast bet-
ween our natural surroundings and the
very advanced computer technology in
which we deal. We write for different
machines but the Einstein is our favour-
ite. There is simply nothing to beat it. It
is so well made so thoroughly reliable
and with its Crystal Research system
software it is so pleasant to use. We are
really quite surprised ourselves at the
scale and variety of the tasks which the
Einstein can take on. We recently
finished a program called Club which
allows records to be kept for up to
10000 members. The search facility will
find a record by name or by code
number in about 30 seconds. The other
facilities include selective print out of
groups which is convenient for jogging
the memories of folk who have forgot-
ten to renew their subscriptions. We
have not yet advertised Club but
already several users have bought it
and seem pleased. An earlier version
of Club brought a delightful postcard
from Paris - it seems that the user had
gained so much extra time that she had
flown over to Paris for the weekend and
wrote us the postcard while sipping
wine in a Paris cafe.

We never know what the post will bring
- last week we received a request from
a user with a life style very like our own.
He lives on a boat on the South coast
and has a vast library of 30000 items
which forms the basis of his successful
business. He needs to build up a data
base with details of each item and
where the item is. At first we were a lit-
tle bit taken aback by the request but
the more we looked into the problem
the more it seemed viable using the
Einstein. It means very large set of data
discs but as each record is connected
only with a small number of other
nearby records there is really no
requirement for a hard disc with all of
its expense and vulnerability. In fact the
data will be safer spread over the small
discs and any one of the records can
again be accessed and used within less
than a minute which is really quite fast
for his purposes.

We seem to be learning more and more
about different types of businesses. We
recently completed a new program cal-
led Barsales which brought us into inti-
mate contact with a wide range of
liquours and whiskies and a host of
other drinks. To write our customised
software each user has to explain in
detail just what his problem is. Its all
very interesting and a lot of fun for us.
One of our Einstein users has a night
club in London with roulette tables
cabaret and four bars. He uses Club
and Barsales with great effect and we
are moving on to do his accounts.

Our charges are quite low - £25 for a
customised program no matter how
long or short a time it takes us to write it.
Of course by this time we have a huge
collection of our own software and we
usually only have to join parts together
which does not take us very long -
hence the low price. Our standard
Peach Pack is popular and again the
price is low at £30 for the complete set
of 10 really practical business prog-
rams all on the one disc.

The financial rewards of our work are
quite adequate for our needs but
perhaps the greatest rewards are the
many friends we are making among our
users who seem to be very grateful for
the trouble we go to in getting the
software right for their particular
needs. At times we are somewhat over-
whelmed by their response. One of our
users a hairdresser who needed a cus-
tomised program for handling invoices
for some 2000 boys at one of the largest
colleges was so pleased he sent us a
huge bouquet of flowers. Another user
a teacher sent us a beautiful plant,
another sent us a huge box of choco-
lates. To our utter amazement a busi-
ness man with a large high quality gift
store sent us an extremely valuable
barometer as a Xmas gift. To say that
we are overwhelmed by all this is put-
ting it mildly. So much for the rugged
tough business world. Our experience
has been that there are very nice
people out there who are grateful for
assistance in getting the best out of
their Einstein.

WDPRO versus TASWORD by ROBIN DURANT

I run a small business, and use a word
Processor for Letters, Statements, Invoices and
other documents, and have tried both WDPRO
and TASWORD and have made the following
observations:-

First of all, may I mention WORDSTAR,
which is, in my opinion, the only one suitable
for the larger business, where there is a per-
son, specially employed to carry out the job of
letter writing etc. My concern is with the type
of business where the Proprietor does most of
the jobs, or where the number of times the
Word Processor is used during the week is
few.

TASWORD

I found this very easy to use, for, what you
see on the screen is the same as the written let-

ter will be. The program customisation is use-
ful, as you can set it up to suit your own busi-
ness requirements. There are options as to the
style of print, should you require them, from
LECTURA to COMPACTA, providing you have
a Tatung TP80 Printer, and there are two Help
pages, should you forget the commands etc.

The major disadvantages I found were
first, that it is only a maximum of 64 characters
per line, where an A4 sheet of paper takes 80,
and second, that it has no PROMPT code.
Otherwise it is a reasonably priced, sophisti-
cated program.

WDPRO

This program is based on entering your
text with codes, prefixed with a 'blob', using
the ESC Key. Once you have learned these
codes, it is very easy to write, but not so easy to
see what you have written, as the way the text
is displayed is not the way it will be printed.
However, there is a command SETV, which
will display your text in the correct manner, if
you wish, or you can space the text in a way that
can be more easily read.

WDPRO allows you to configure it to the
features of your own Printer and lists 6 major
manufacturers. It also allows you to set it at 40
or 80 column.

Another nice feature is the ability to pro-
gram the 8 Function Keys on the Einstein (16 with
shift), to each of the commands, this saves time
when operating.

The one feature which requires consider-
ation is the PROMPT code. This enables you to
enter a short text from the keyboard into the
output while printing, i.e. if one letter is being

sent to many people, then the PROMPT will ask
"Name", "Address", which you will enter. It
also is very useful if using the Processor for
Statements or Invoices etc. which differ each
time. I know that other programs enable you to
alter the variables, but this one reminds you
what the alterations are.

The variations in Script style are
restricted to Double Width and Emphasised on
this program, but others can be obtained by
use of other codes.

CONCLUSION

There are, of course, many more facilities
on each of the programs, which I have not men-
tioned, but I have tried to name the main points
which would be important to the small
businessman who may not be interested in the
finer attributes of a program, but more in the
effectiveness and simplicity of it, related to his
own requirements.

I feel that, if only standard Reports or Let-
ters are required then, the TASWORD for
around £20.00 is for you, but if you are going to
use it for other uses, such as non-standard Let-
ters or Invoices etc., then it is going to cost you
around £58.00 for the WDPRO.

PS

I have had trouble in getting the Centre-
ing Code, Blob C, to work. If you are also hav-
ing the same problem, try the following:-

Blob C, (text), Blob M, Blob C-.

That is, putting the M Code before the cancel-
ling C Code.

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EINSTEIN DUST COVERS

They are made of a special anti-static, lightweight nylon type fabric, which is both tough and durable.

The effect is very pleasing and we are especially pleased with the contoured styling of the cover, that follows the lines of the monitor and keyboard. (It's not box shaped!)

Allowance has been made on both covers for wiring, at the rear of the machines and of course the 80 column adaptor unit.

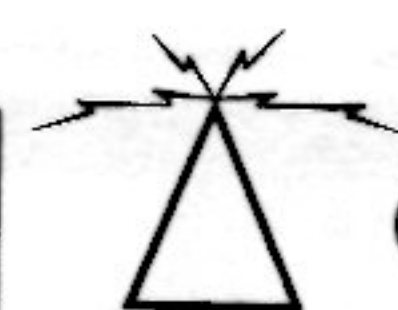
Since making the original items we have received enquiries for matching covers for alternative printers.

Some of these are now standard items but there is no problem in producing to order, provided that we have the model number and its basic dimensions.

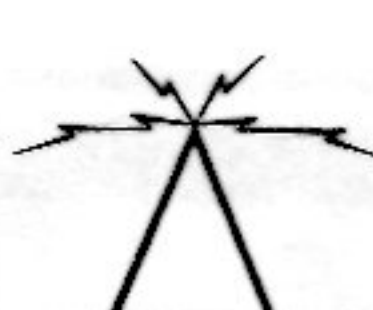
You'd be amazed what we are asked to cover!

COMMUNICATIONS



The rapidly growing interest in communications being shown by home computer owners, is akin to the rapid growth in Amateur Radio enthusiasts which has been taking place since about 1980. The idea of communication with some far off computer or person holds a strange fascination, and once experienced, will be a source of pleasure and interest for evermore. However, getting there can be fraught with heartache, particularly for the relative novice, so here are a few things to be wary of when considering the purchase of some communications equipment. First, what will you need? You will need a MODEM, which is the device which allows the Computer to link to the Phone, a Cable, to connect the computer to the modem, and some SOFTWARE, to allow the computer to interpret what is coming into it from the MODEM. If you wish to use PRESTEL then the MODEM must be capable of accepting 1200 Bauds Receive and 75 Bauds Transmit, a standard adopted by PRESTEL, and now being taken up by a lot of Bulletin Boards. If your MODEM does not have a 1200/75 Split Baud Rate option, then no communication with PRESTEL will be possible. The second requirement is for a suitable piece of software, and as far as we Einstein Users are concerned, that means just one thing, Communications with Viewdata from KUMA. If your hope is to use your Einstein as a TELEX machine, or as a means of accessing bulletin boards, then you will need to set the MODEM for 300/300 half Duplex (this simply means that communication is ONE WAY AT A TIME, unlike the telephone where each party can talk at the same time (FULL DUPLEX)). Software for such applications is more widely available, and for those who do not have a sophisticated requirement, then PETER AMEY's Hackers Delight, again from KUMA, is a very good buy. For those who wish to prepare text OFF LINE and then send it via an Electronic Mail Box service like One-to-One, the software package called INTEXT from the Business Computer Centre in Telford, is a must. Although this package is around the £115.00 mark, it does all that is required of a sophisticated Comms package, and indeed with this package, you could replace the office Telex machine quite confidently. Subscribing to an electronic mail box service, like One-to-One, is an ideal way of cutting down on Telex Charges and indeed on postal charges, since all electronic mail is sent and retrieved free of charge, with the user paying only for ON LINE time, and this cheap. Full details of this electronic mail service is available from Dr. Mike Bayliss at The Business Computer Centre (see their advert in this issue).



PRINTERS



Over the past few years, the number of people who have added a PRINTER to their home computers has grown enormously, and yet people still get caught out by the "fast operators" who sell totally unsuitable printers to the poor novice. The biggest mistake to make, is choosing a SERIAL printer instead of a Centronics Printer. Not that there is anything wrong with SERIAL printers, they work well. The problem is that nearly ALL of the software written for the Einstein requires the use of a printer with a CENTRONICS interface, so those cheap offers of printers with RS232 (Serial) interfaces, are to be guarded against. The next biggest question which the user must ask is

DO I REQUIRE FULL LETTER QUALITY?

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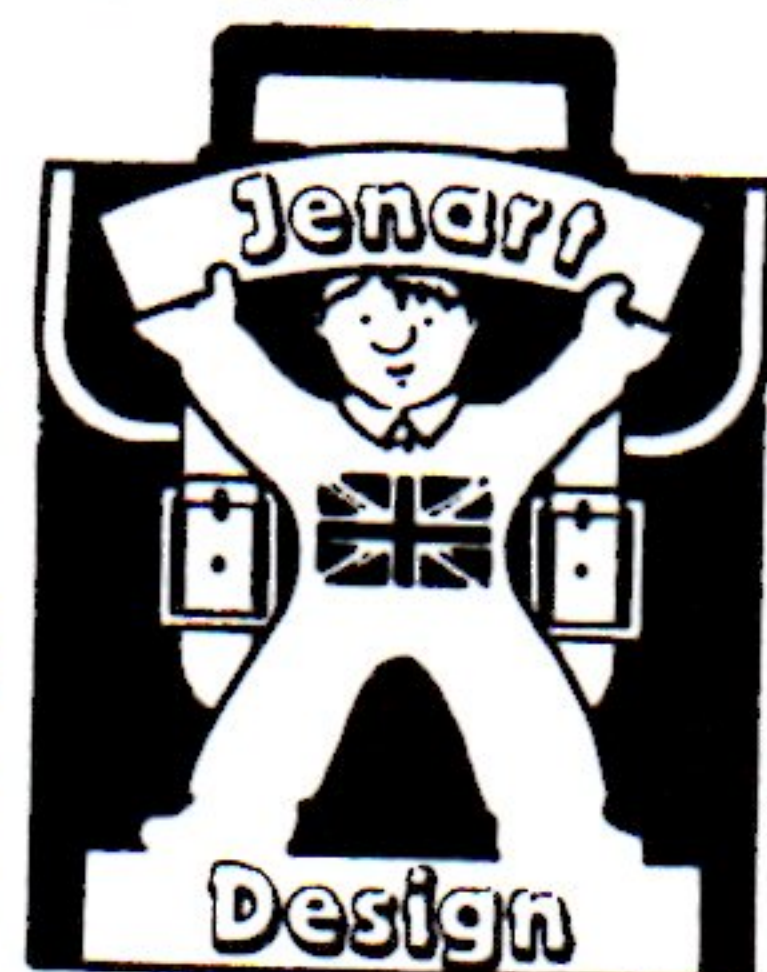
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PATTERNS OF CHAOS

THE MANDELBROT SET

"The Mandelbrot set broods in silent complexity at the centre of a vast sheet of numbers called the complex plane. When a certain operation is applied repeatedly to the numbers, the ones outside the set flee to infinity. The numbers inside remain to drift or dance about. Close to the boundary minutely choreographed wanderings mark the one onset of instability. Here is an infinite regress of detail that astonishes us with its variety, its complexity and its strange beauty"

So wrote A.K. Dewdney, and I can find no better words to describe this structured marvel, discovered only a few years ago by mathematician Benoit Mandelbrot.

To keep it short, it is a fact that some non-linear iterative processes are unstable for certain numerical values, and in the region of instability, chaos is manifested. By "non-linear" I mean functions whose graphs are not straight lines, such as powers of x . By "iterative" I mean a process in which a number is calculated from x , and the result is fed back as the new value of x in the same process, and so on repeatedly.

Mathematicians have a habit of borrowing ordinary everyday words like root, map, set, domain, prime and so forth, and using them with very special and precisely defined meanings. Chaos is a precise mathematical term applied to irregular behaviour generated by a deterministic (and therefore calculable) process, as distinct from a truly random and unpredictable process such as the decay of radioactive nuclei. Chaos has an irregular, subtle but ordered structure which may be displayed by suitable mappings. In fact mapping in what mathematicians call the complex plane turns out to be the best way to display and visualise the patterns of instability and chaos.

IMAGINARY AND COMPLEX NUMBERS

This brings us to the awkward number represented by i , the square root of -1 . At this point you may well feel like turning to Space Invaders as more manageable and entertaining, but bear with me for half a page and I guarantee you'll find nothing incomprehensible about complex numbers.

The numbers we use in everyday life - real numbers - are single entities (like hats) such as 3.14159, -7 , or 29. A complex number is made of two parts (like a pair of trousers). By convention, the first part is called the real component, and the other bit, the imaginary component, is just a multiplier for our daunting but useful friend i . Thus two complex numbers might be $-3+4i$ and $2-3i$.

The rules of complex arithmetic are simple. To add two complex numbers, just add the real and imaginary parts separately. Thus $-3+4i$ plus $2-3i$ is $-1+i$.

Multiplication is no harder. Remembering school algebra:

$$(-3+4i)(2-3i) = -6+8i+9i-12i^2 = -6-i-12i^2$$

As the awkward i is -1 it unfortunately squares to give -1 , so the complex product becomes $-6-i(-12)$ or simply $6-i$.

We can express the size of a complex number as the square

root of the of the sum of the squares of the two parts; in this case $36-(-1)$ or 37, which is near enough 6.082.

Painless, wasn't it? Now you know enough about complex arithmetic to write your own computer programmes.

THE MANDELBROT SET

If we take a complex number Z (consisting of course of a real part RZ and an imaginary part IZ), square it, and add a complex constant C ($RC+IC$), we obtain another complex number. If we put this back into the formula as the new value of Z and go on doing this (iteration) a great many times, one of two things will happen. Either its size will get very large, or it will dot about but still remain at some moderate value. Numbers which do not go screaming off to infinity under this iterative treatment belong to the Mandelbrot set. The best way to visualise them is to plot them on a graph, their real parts on the x -axis and the imaginary parts on the y -axis. This is all that is meant by a "mapping in the complex plane".

PROGRAMMING

Now we are in a position to generate a 2-dimensional picture of the Mandelbrot set on the Einstein. The steps are as follows:

1. Consider a square window on the screen with side 2.5 units long having its south-west corner located at $x=-2$, $y=1.25$. Assuming we have 192×192 pixels in this window, calculate the co-ordinates of each pixel and use each pair of co-ordinates as the real and imaginary parts of a complex constant C to be used in the next step.
2. For every constant in turn, start with $Z=0$ (that is, $0+0i$) and apply the process $Z=Z^2+C$, in other words square Z and add C using the rules of complex arithmetic.
3. Take the result as the new value of Z and repeat step (2).
4. Do this 100 times, and if at any stage the size of Z ($RZ + IZ$) exceeds 2, stop iterating and plot the corresponding pixel the same colour as the background. Any complex number which gets this big is guaranteed to be on its way to infinity, so waste no more computer time on it. If Z survives 100 iterations, colour the corresponding pixel white.
5. Repeat (2) to (4) for every value of C , ie for every pixel in the window.

A programme in BBCBASIC is given below. If you are using a colour monitor you have 192, not 768, pixels to play with. If all the pixels required the full 100 iterations the programme would go through lines 230-290 3.7 million times, and the BASIC interpreter takes 11.5 hours to wade through this.

The programme can be speeded up by using fewer pixels, iterating less than 100 times, using a language which is compiled rather than interpreted (such as FORTRAN), or using machine code for the frequently executed lines.

The definition of the picture can be improved, if you have a dot matrix printer capable of bit image mode, by plotting a dot or a blank for every possible position of a single pin on the print head. If you can command 60 dots per inch across an 8"

paper width, and can specify a linefeed of $1/60$ th of an inch, you have the equivalent of $480 \times 480 = 230,000$ pixels, and the definition is much improved (at the expense of execution time!)

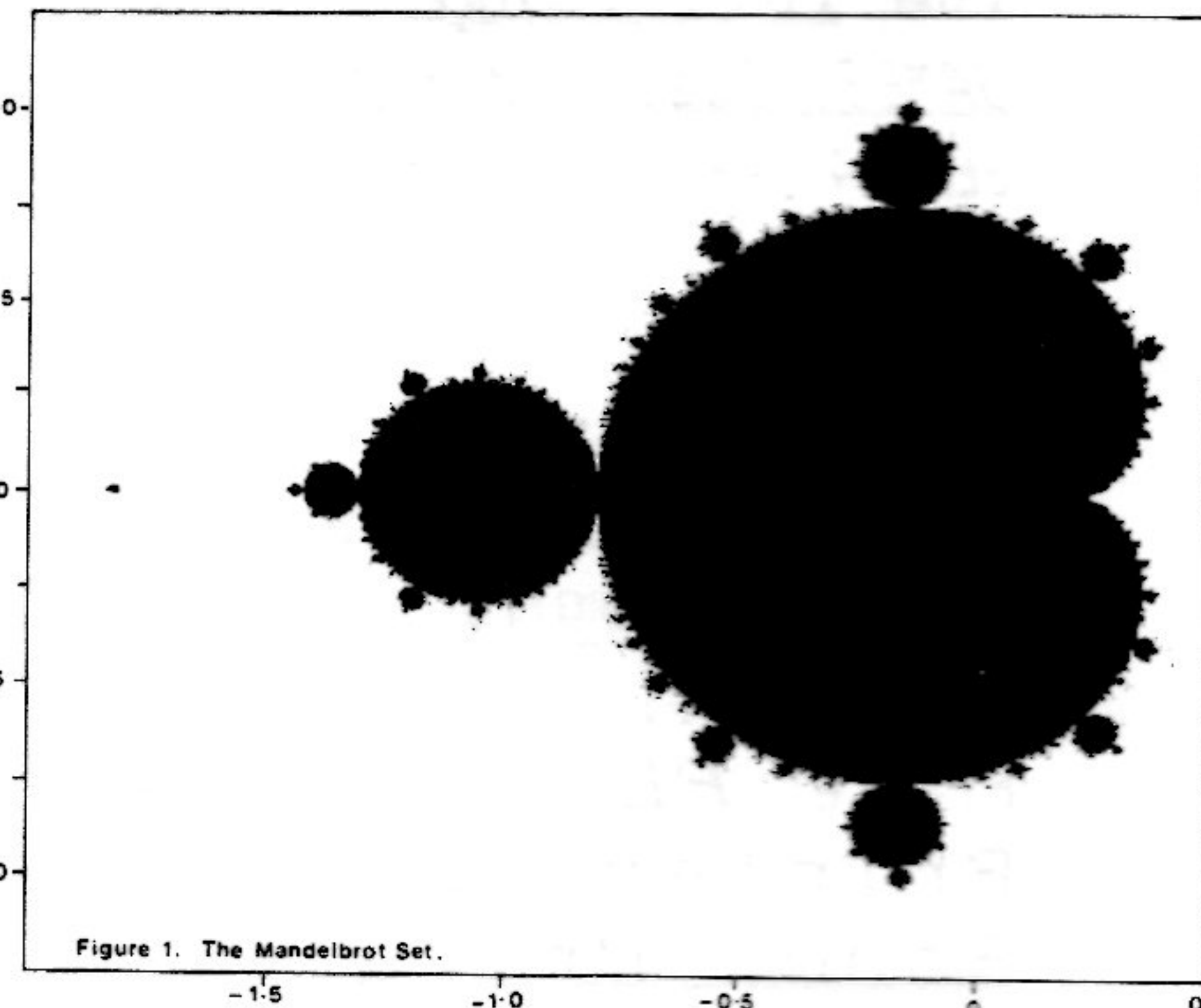


Figure 1. The Mandelbrot Set.

Figure 1 was produced in this way.

WHAT YOU SHOULD GET

The Mandelbrot looks like a squashed bug, covered with warts and excrescences, each wart resembling but not identical with the parent figure. By choosing more restricted windows in the complex plane you can magnify parts of the border, and it turns out that there are warts on the warts and so ad infinitum. For large magnifications it becomes necessary to use double precision arithmetic to avoid the iteration step falsely flying off to infinity because of small repeated rounding errors.

Space does not permit more than a mention of the beautiful effects which can be obtained by assigning graded colours to the pixels representing values of C which are marginally unstable, just outside the Mandelbrot figure. See A.K. Dewdney's excellent article in "Scientific American" (August 1985), and Howard Oakley's programme in PCW (January 1986).

If you're thinking of using the Einstein's colour graphics, be warned in advance that, in spite of what the book implies, you can't colour all the pixels differently.

There is a closely related subject called Julia sets, and the next issue will continue the theme of Patterns of Chaos for this phenomenon.

After playing with Mandelbrot and Julia sets for two months and having only scratched the surface, I still marvel that a formula as simple as $Z=Z^2+C$ can give rise to such intricately complex patterns. Beats a spirograph hollow! (to be cont -ED).

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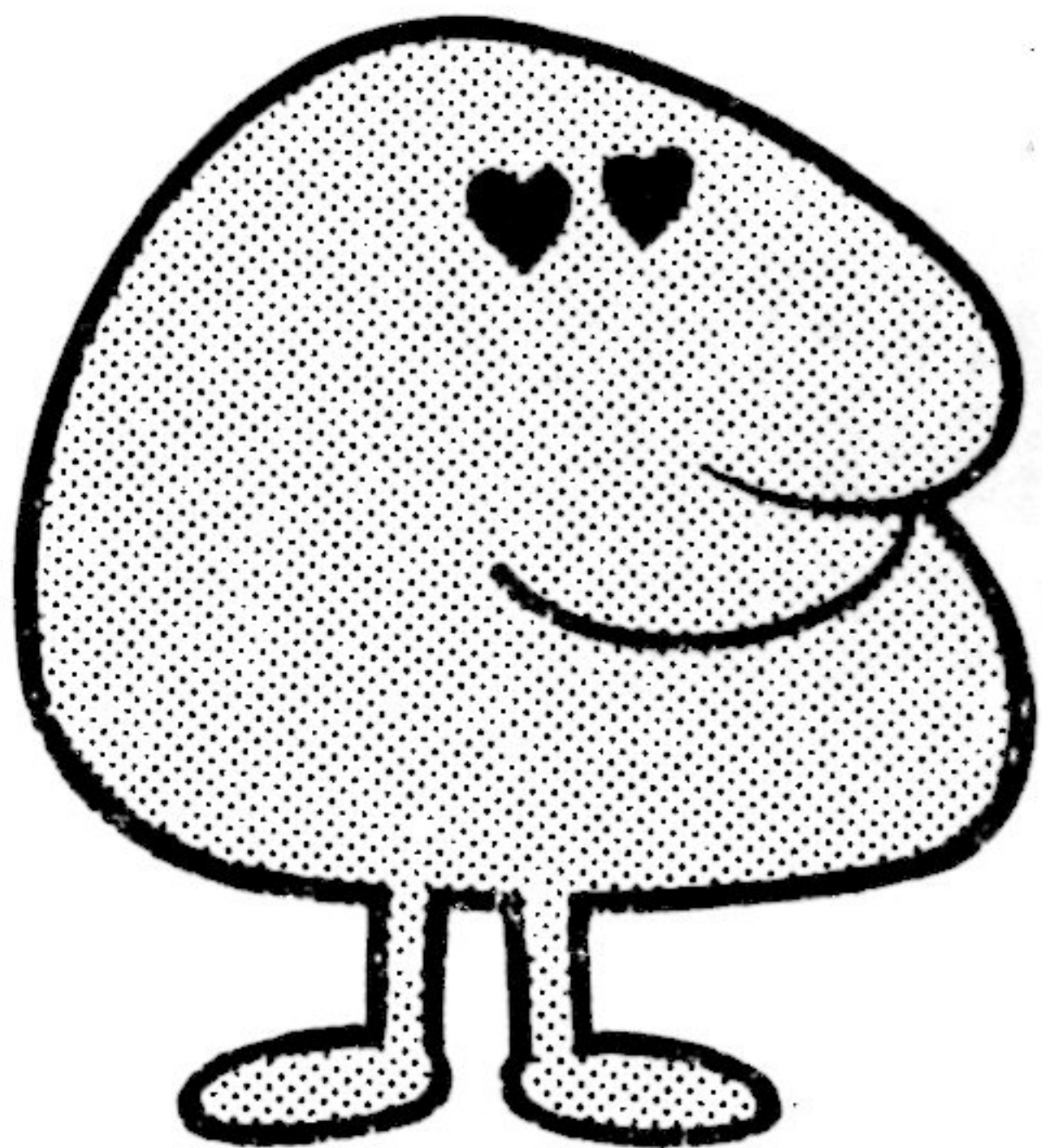


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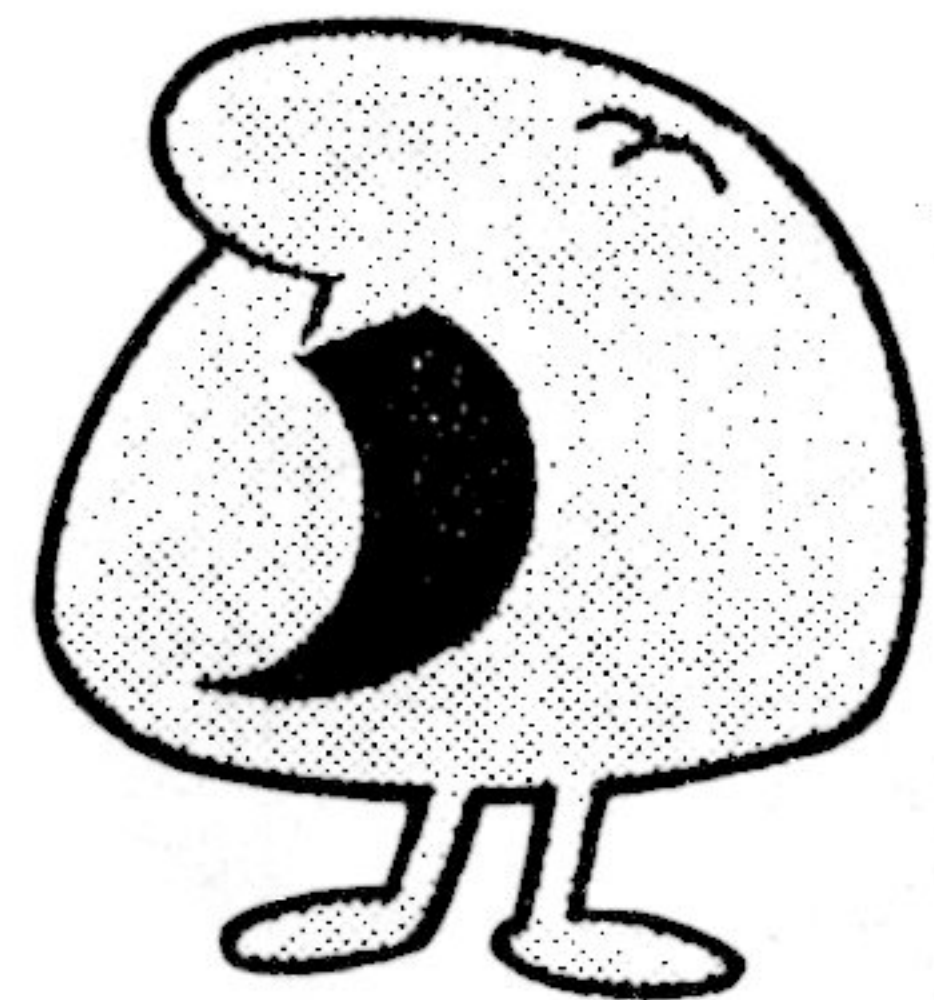

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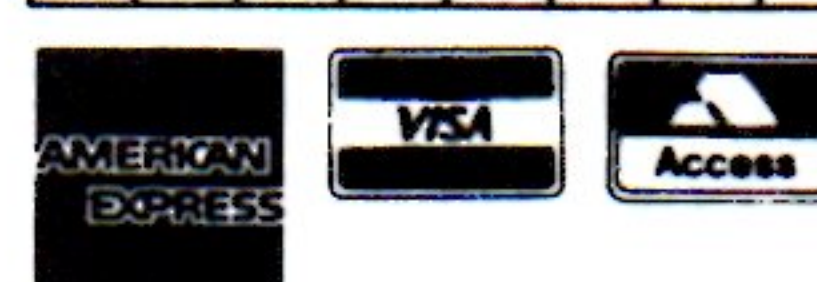
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
